POWER Outage? Not At All.

So many of Arch Street Church's members have responded to the many calls for support over the last few years for Philadelphians Organized to Witness, Empower and Rebuild (POWER). You have made phone calls to voters and knocked on their doors, donated money, visited legislators in their offices in City Hall and in Harrisburg, showed up at rallies and marches, participated in religious services for racial justice, and walked in the largest MLK parade in the country (to name a few POWER actions).

If you have been wondering why your help hasn't been requested lately and have been thinking that the organization responsible for wage increases and real hope for public education is on vacation, you will be glad to know that POWER is in a very active process of reflecting and renewing. While so much has been done, and POWER is now a recognized force for moral justice in the city and state, we can do better.

With help from an outside contractor and input from hundreds of POWER members (including from our church) a top to bottom appraisal is underway. A new board structure is being implemented. We are taking a hard look at organizational issues of race and gender. A need for better communication in all aspects has been acknowledged.

Last week new city councilwoman Helen Gym was the featured speaker at POWER's annual fundraiser. Mayor-elect Jim Kenney was there too and said he expects us to keep up the pressure on him to stay on track on the issues that matter to us.

So while we are not pounding the pavements, calling, attending workshops and meetings as intensely as a few months ago, our work has not stopped and won't stop until Philadelphians are working, wages allow for a life of dignity, and our children are offered an education equal to that of children in wealthy suburbs.

Place a Chrismon on the Christmas tree and provide a gift of hope for a refugee

Throughout the world, the topic of discussion the past month has been who is going to accept refugee families to live in their midst. As usual we can feel proud that Arch Street Church has been ahead of the game. If you remember we were doing something about this for a few years now. It has been a topic of United Methodist Women book study, we have supported a refugee family living in a Philadelphia Church and we have been tuned into the topic in many a sermon. Last year's gift giving for Advent was for refugee families that are relocating to the Philadelphia area. We have even maintained a house for an immigrant family, which by the way was sold this year.

These refugees are men, women and children whose home countries are in situations that have forced them to leave due to violence, war, or persecution just because of their ethnicity, politics, or religion. Refugees are driven from their homes and communities by factors outside their control. Many have lived in refugee camps in a second country for a long time; the average time in refugee camps is 17 years. We've seen pictures of these as of late on the television news shows. The refugees cannot return to their home country because violence and persecution continues and even worsens daily. There are over 16 million refugees around the world. A few of the lucky ones are given the opportunity to build new lives in the United States, and each year hundreds arrive in Philadelphia and are resettled by the Nationalities Service Center. These people are not undocumented. They have been given permission to come to America by the U.S. State Department.

Usually they arrive with nothing but the clothes on their backs so often they are clothes not suitable Philadelphia's climate as they may come from the tropics or desert. They are given very little financial assistance and are expected to support themselves almost immediately. They even have to pay back the cost of the airfare from the refugee camp to America. Imagine arriving in a new country where you do not know the language or culture, where you have no friends or family, and you must go right out to find work in order to survive in this foreign land. We can make it a little easier on them this holiday season by providing a warm welcome to some of these brave and resilient newcomers.

*After you have received communion at the altar rail, turn behind you to the front pew. Choose a Chrismon to decorate the tree, attached will be a gift tag of an item needed by one of the refugees. Place the Chrismon in the usher's basket, but KEEP the tag attached. Over the next two weeks you will want to purchase the specific item and bring it with you to church by Sunday, December 20th. **DO NOT WRAP THE GIFT !PLACE IT IN A HEAVY DUTY RECYCLABLE SHOPPING BAG (preferably cloth) ALONG WITH THE COLOR CODED GIFT TAG,***

(The color helps us separate the gifts and get them to the proper family) You will see from the tags that the refugees are from around the world— Iraq, Honduras, Congo, Mauritania, Nepal, Bhutan, Burma, Afghanistan, Eritrea, Liberia, the Sudan, Ethiopia, and Cameroon. These are men, women, children, and small babies who have fled their home and come to Philadelphia to begin a new life hopefully free from danger.

The gifts will be distributed to the families by the staff at the Nationalities Service Center (NSC), our neighbor at 1216 Arch Street. Thank you to the many that have helped with the NSC Thanksgiving dinner headed up by our own Margaret Harris and lovingly prepared by Marge Donnelly. NSC is a nonprofit organization that has been helping immigrants and refugees since 1921. It has been Margaret Harris' great privilege to teach English as a Second Language classes there for over 25 years. NSC is the biggest refugee resettlement agency in the Delaware Valley. The staff of case managers has chosen items their refugee families most need.

As we celebrate the birth of Christ, we remember that Jesus himself was a refugee while still an infant, when his parents fled to Egypt to save his life. We certainly would not want to leave the holy family shunned and desolate. What if by chance there is a holy family among the refugees coming to our doorstep. "Whatever you have done to the least of these...you have done to me."

Please open your hearts this Advent to provide hope, joy and encouragement to the refugees in our midst, our new neighbors and friends. To learn more about helping these families in many other ways, contact Margaret Harris through the church office. It promises to be a rewarding experience.
