

WHAT'S HAPPENING



INSPIRATION for Father's Day was Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart, who reared six children after his wife died.

History of Fathers Day

Sonora Louise Smart was born to farmer [William Jackson Smart](#) (1842-1919) and his wife Ellen Victoria Cheek Smart (1851-1898). William Smart was a sergeant in the Union's First Arkansas Light Artillery during the Civil War. When Sonora was 16, her mother died in childbirth with her sixth child. Sonora was the only daughter and shared with her father William in the raising of her younger brothers, including her new infant brother Marshall. Smart held her father in great esteem. While hearing a church sermon about the newly recognized [Mother's Day](#) at Central Methodist Episcopal Church, Sonora felt strongly that fatherhood needed recognition as well. She approached the Spokane Ministerial Alliance and suggested her own father's birthday, of June 5, as the day of honor for fathers. The Alliance chose the third Sunday in June instead. The first Father's Day was celebrated June 19, 1910. Although observance of the holiday faded in the 1920s, over time, the idea of Father's Day became popular and embraced across the nation. In 1916, President [Woodrow Wilson](#) sent a telegraph to Spokane praising Father's Day services. In 1966, President [Lyndon B. Johnson](#) signed a [presidential proclamation](#) declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day. In 1972, President [Nixon](#) established a permanent national observance of Father's Day to be held on the 3rd Sunday of June each year.

Can ASUMC turn out the RAE?

(Acronym of the Month!)

The **Rising American Electorate** makes up 53% of our fellow citizens, but a much smaller percentage of fellow voters. There are large numbers of the RAE (a demographic group comprised of unmarried women, “millennials” (adults under 30), and people of color (African Americans, Latinos, other minorities)), who are unregistered and underrepresented in our political system. If this demographic voted, our government would look much different.

POWER (Philadelphiaans Organized to Witness, Empower and Rebuild) has determined, by a unanimous vote of its member congregations, to **register thousands of new voters before the November 2016 election**. POWER is a non-partisan organization of 45+ faith groups, and we want everyone eligible to vote to go to the polls this year.

We are asking Arch Streeters to commit to: **1.** attending a voter registration training and **2.** staffing a voter registration table for as many two hour shifts as you can.

Voter registration tables will be set up inside and outside the church on specific days and at other locations to be determined by the volunteers: The big flea market in your neighborhood? Outside one of Philly’s great summer “Pop-Up” bars on a summer evening? On the parkway on 4th of July weekend? This summer voter registration campaign will start in July continue through early fall.

Please help us bring more Americans into the democratic process. **Share your name and contact information with us today after the 8:30 and the 11:00 services. We will be just outside the chapel.**

Join Arch Street's Immigration Team

Arch Street UMC is a congregational member of the New Sanctuary Movement (NSM), an interfaith movement which works to end injustices against immigrants regardless of immigration status, express radical welcome for all, and ensure that values of dignity, justice, and hospitality are lived out in practice and upheld in policy. We accompany people who are facing deportation and hold workshops to provide information about rights. In the past, NSM worked successfully to make Philadelphia a Sanctuary City. Now NSM is working to make Driver's Licenses available to all, regardless of immigration status. We are working to stop the deportation raids. Recently the Obama Administration announced a new round of deportation raids targeting Central American refugee families. We are working to ensure all our immigrant members know what to do in case of a raid and we have organized teams to take action when we learn of a raid. NSM has an emergency hotline to call if you see an ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency) raid taking place.

Teams of NSM Congregational members have been organized to respond to reported raids.

- A phone tree will start to notify everyone signed up to respond. After the closest congregations are called, we will then call other congregations
- The team will immediately head to the site of the raid
- One person on the team will call others on the phone tree
- The team will gather on the block of the raid.
- The team will hold a vigil - songs, prayer, and any other practice that is meaningful to the congregation.
- The group will take photos and film the raid and NSM staff will call press. We will stay until ICE leaves
- After, we will talk with the family to provide guidance on next steps, talk about accompaniment and be a support for the
- Each team will have a response kit – an NSM banner, signs, an agenda, NSM business cards, and a guide for press. Members should wear NSM t-shirts and make sure the signs are visible. ICE officers are sometimes dressed in street clothes so we want to make sure the family knows we are supporters and not ICE.

New Sanctuary Movement holds a **General Assembly** every other month to provide information about our campaigns and to make plans to implement our goals.
