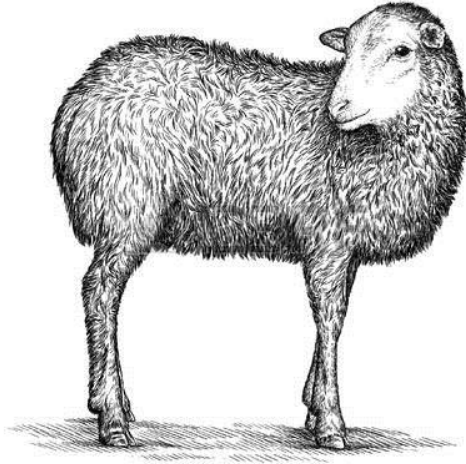

CCORD Asks, “Where is the Restaurant?”



The Aloft Hotel (101 N Broad Street) is a new hotel development, immediately across the street from Arch Street United Methodist Church. They are benefitting from \$33 million in tax-payer subsidies. In return for those subsidies it is reasonable that the project provide a significant community benefit. Often that benefit is defined in terms of the number of permanent jobs created. In this case, the project promised 170 jobs, but due to a change in plan 115 of those jobs were eliminated when they decided not to include a full-service restaurant. That change in plan did not affect the public subsidies. In fact, one funding source required that the project benefit a low-income community and it is clear Center City is not that.

ASUMC along with Old Frist Reformed United Church of Christ, The Ethical Society and POWER are a member of *Center City Organized for Responsible Development (CCORD)*. **CCORD** is registered with the City Planning Commission as a Recognized Community Organization and are authorized to engage developers in dialogue about their projects. **CCORD** has many questions concerning the community benefit now associated with the Aloft Hotel and has made several requests for information and a meeting to discuss questions without any success!

The time has come to stage an action that will press the developer to sit down with the members of **CCORD** and have a forthright dialogue about the public benefit the project will provide.

Please help us make this ask by joining us:

On the steps of ASUMC, on the Arch Street side across from the Aloft Hotel

Our goal is to gather 115 people to represent the number of jobs eliminated from their broken promise.

Our message is clear: Where is the restaurant? Where are the jobs? Where is the community benefit? Where is the accountability? There is a “RESTAURANT THEME” for the action and those attending are asked to wear an apron, chef’s hat or bring cooking utensils, pot and pans.

ASUMC is responsible for turning out 20 people to the event. Reverend Hynicka has been asked to address the rally and would appreciate your support.

New Sanctuary Movement

While we fight the Trump Administration's ending of DACA and increased enforcement, it is critical we move Philadelphia forward to create real Sanctuary for all. We are so grateful for the leadership Mayor Kenney has taken to fiercely defend Philly's Sanctuary city policy, AND we need to remind him that he needs to build on this leadership. He has the power to create local change no matter who is President, and he can amend the **Live Stop Law** to give people 30 minutes to call a friend or family member with a license to get their car. This can alleviate the fear and economic toll on poor people in Philly.

The United Methodist Church supports the steps taken by President Obama (including DACA) as a necessary, temporary step that allowed certain groups of immigrants to apply for temporary legal status ([Book of Resolutions, 3281](#)). The Church also supports the adoption of the DREAM Act as legislation to protect DACA recipients ([Book of Resolutions, 3164](#)).



A 5-Year Strategic Plan *and* a Possible New Team!

POWER's strategy teams have already planned their 1-year campaigns to achieve these major goals:

- Distribute *all* state education funding through the Fair Funding formula
- Dissolve Philadelphia's School Reform Commission and return our schools to local control
- Gain a 21st Century Living Wage of \$15/hr. for Philadelphia's contracted and subcontracted workers
- Get PECO's commitment to source 20% of its energy from local renewable sources by 2025
- End cash bail

The updated strategic plans are posted on the bulletin board in the chapel lobby or ask Nancy Megley for a copy.

Now the teams are drafting a 5-year strategic plan to lay out their vision for where we go next. At the quarterly Legislative Assembly next month, we will hear that plan and also vote on a proposal to establish a new Green Justice strategy team, split off from Economic Dignity. The Assembly will take place ***Tuesday, October 10th, from 7:00-9:00 PM*** (pizza at 6:30) at Congregation Mishkan Shalom, 4101 Freeland Avenue, Philadelphia 19128 (Roxborough). 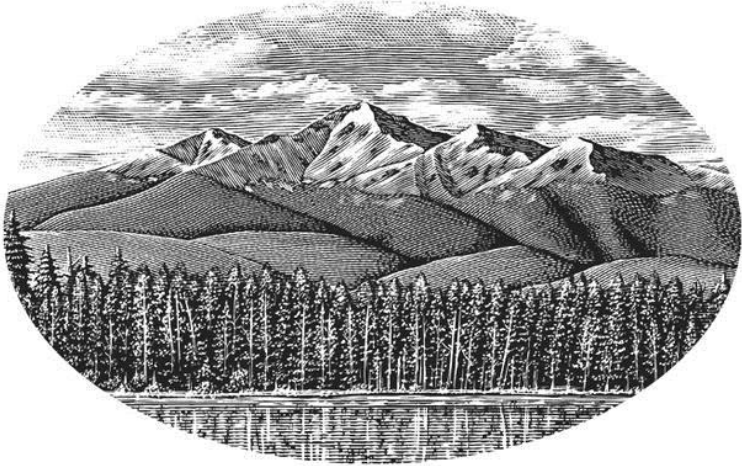
