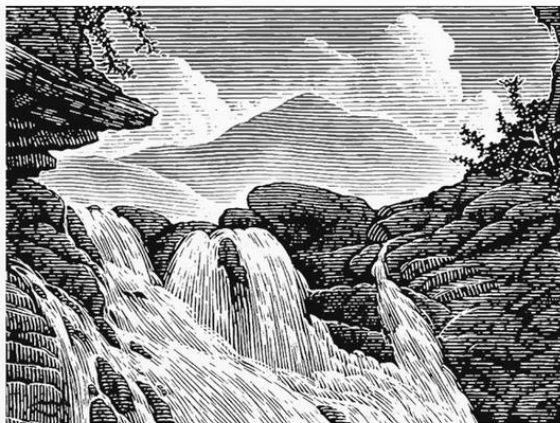

Book discussion on October 15 for all:

Falling Into Place: A Memoir of Overcoming by Hattie Kaufman

Get your copy of and start reading! The UMW will host a book discussion in the second floor conference room immediately following the 11 am Worship Service. Everyone is welcome, including men, visitors and even those who have not read the book. If you'd like to buy the book, look for me. I can usually be found at the 11 am service sitting in the front near Wilhelmina.

What's the book about? Four-time Emmy Award-winning news correspondent shares her emotionally gripping and entertaining story of finding faith and overcoming the wounds of abuse, poverty, alcoholism, and divorce.

Hattie Kauffman has interviewed presidents, Oscar winners, astronauts, and Olympians. She's covered wildfires and murder trials and delved into personal interest stories. Though she uncovered the stories behind big personalities and events, her own story remained untold.

In this beautifully written memoir, you'll get an inside look into the events that shaped this remarkable woman who thought she'd left the ghosts of childhood behind her. But when her world came crashing down one autumn day, she was forced to face all that she had been running from.

What she learned about herself surprised her.

She was never alone in her flight and, indeed, had never needed to run in the first place. **Hattie Kauffman** made history as the first Native American journalist to ever file a report on a national network evening news broadcast, and she has over two decades of experience as an on-camera correspondent and news anchor for ABC and CBS. She is a member of the Nez Perce Tribe of Idaho and is also a speaker and writer.

"Kauffman teaches us that the seeds of God's love grow strongly oftentimes in the soil of suffering and always in the sunshine of surrender.

POWER Actions *This Week*

Monday, September 25th: POWER's "Wake Up! Day of Action"

At POWER's June 21st action in Harrisburg, we were promised a meeting with the Senate Education Committee to present our data on the racial bias in school funding. Sen. John Eichelberger, the committee chair, is dodging POWER's requests to set a date for that meeting. A sample script appears below—feel free to say this in your own words.

Hello, Senator Eichelberger, my name is _____ and I'm calling as part of POWER, an interfaith coalition of congregations across Southeastern Pennsylvania committed to opportunity and justice for all. I want to thank you for meeting with POWER lay and clergy leaders when we were in Harrisburg in June and for taking an interest in the serious and persistent problem of racial and income-based disparities in the way basic education funding is distributed to school districts across Pennsylvania. We appreciated that you agreed to schedule a hearing of your full committee to dig into the issue more deeply. We know the Assembly has been busy working on the budget but I hope that would not prevent us from planning ahead to schedule time to share what we've learned about this issue with the members of your committee in the fall. As a person of faith, I believe that we have a moral obligation to educate all children equally and fully regardless of their race, ethnicity, income level, or geography. Thank you again for working with us on this important issue.

POWER's Work in 2017-18 and How You Can Help

POWER's strategy teams have written action plans for the coming year. These are posted on the bulletin board in the chapel lobby—read them when you can and *watch this bulletin* for announcements about upcoming actions that need our support. The goals are:

- Distribute *all* state education funding through the Fair Funding formula (*see notice above about September 25th action*)
- Dissolve Philadelphia's School Reform Commission and return our schools to local control
- Gain a 21st Century Living Wage of \$15/hr for Philadelphia's contracted and subcontracted workers
- Get PECO's commitment to source 20% of its energy from local renewable sources by 2025
- End cash bail

Next the teams are drafting a 5-year strategic plan to lay out their vision for where we go next. At the quarterly Legislative Assembly next month, we will hear that plan and also vote on a proposal to establish a new Green Justice strategy team, split off from Economic Dignity. The Assembly will take place ***Tuesday, October 10th, from 7:00-9:00 PM*** (pizza at 6:30) at Congregation Mishkan Shalom, 4101 Freeland Avenue, Philadelphia 19128 (Roxborough). Rides are usually available so let us know if you are coming.

ALO(SS) Hotel Action; POWER-ing Through the Rain

On Tuesday September 19th, about 100 people gathered outside of Aloft Hotel to protest their misuse of 33 million dollars of tax payer subsidies to build their complex. In exchange for the subsidies, Aloft had promised to build a restaurant that would have supplied the city with 170 new jobs. They did not follow through with the restaurant, and 117 of those positions were not created. So at 5pm on Tuesday, members of Power, Unite, CCORD, and many of ASUMC met outside Aloft Hotel dressed in chef's hats with signs and loud voices.

Almost the moment we all gathered, it began to rain. Reverend Robin Hynicka and Reverend Gregory Holston united the crowd with social justice speeches, pulling in the attention of the public to our cause. Different members of groups also spoke to the press, including Channel 6 News and local newspaper affiliates. Reverend Carol Duncan delivered a statement to the representative of the hotel and communicated our purpose to Councilwoman Helen Gym. We were heartened to see the amount of people who stood firm for the cause, drenched out in the rain for the entire hour. The event came to a close with a speech from Councilman Squilla, promising to follow through on the group's collective concerns. We will hold him to his word!

Dear _____:

As constituents from Pennsylvania and as United Methodist persons of faith, we urge you to stand with the nearly 800,000 Dreamers in the United States who have benefited from DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) by supporting the passage of a Dream Act bill that will grant full protection from deportation.

The United Methodist Church affirms the inherent worth, dignity and human rights of all people, regardless of race, nationality or legal status. God commands us to love and embrace the immigrant, who "*shall be to you as the citizen among you.*" (Leviticus 19:33-34).

Eliminating the DACA program denies the stance we have taken as a nation to care for children and to support programs that benefit families. Young people who came to the United States as children are being punished and denied a future that can contribute to their well-being and to benefit our country.

The Dreamers have had to pay legal and processing fees in order to have the benefits from the DACA program to work and attend school. In order to work, they must apply for work permits every two years at a cost of approximately \$500. These young people have contributed to our society by working in diverse industries, medical institutions, the military, etc., paying taxes and Social Security without being eligible for any of those benefits.

We urge you to pass legislations that will grant these young people the ability to live and work legally in the United States contributing to our society without fear of separation from their families, deportation to countries they do not know and languages they do not speak.
