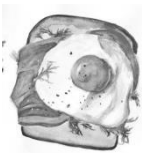

### **Holiday Gifts for Refugees: Take a card today to buy a gift!**

This year has been a frightening time for immigrants and refugees, as the U.S. has chosen to turn its back on the thousands of people seeking safety from war, persecution, and violence. Nevertheless, the Nationalities Service Center (NSC) has continued to welcome refugees to the Philadelphia area, and to protect and help those who are already here... If you were lucky enough to be at the NSC Thanksgiving celebration, which took place at Arch Street Church on Saturday November 18, you got a chance to meet some of these wonderful new members of our community. Now it is more important than ever that we welcome and support our new neighbors. One way we can do this is by buying some things they need to help them rebuild their lives here.

**We will be collecting holiday gifts for refugees again this Advent season. From Sunday, November 26 and for the next two Sundays, you will have the opportunity to choose a gift to buy for a newly arrived refugee.** These gift items have been identified by NSC staff as things these families really need or want. Margaret and other volunteers will be at the doors as you exit the sanctuary today with a collection of postcards with a description of the requested item on each card. These items will be specific such as "coat for Syrian girl, size 3T" and an identification number, such as # 4. Take the card for the gift you wish to purchase, and sign a sheet so that we can have a record of who is purchasing what. **After purchasing the gift, bring the gift along with the original card in a bag to the church by Sunday December 17th.** Do not wrap the present since we need to be able to identify the gifts. ## **Unique Ideas for Your Holiday Gift-Giving**

Are you stumped about what to give a loved one this Christmas? Maybe they don't need another pair of shoes or another tie. Maybe they do not need anything! Consider giving them (or you!) a tax-deductible gift that will provide a once-in-a-lifetime experience and support our ASUMC ministry! We are about to embark on a \$250,000 façade repair program. These gifts will help us fund the program. Here are our suggestions:

1. \$25. Receive a piece of stone that was removed from the façade during the repairs.
2. \$50. Group guided tour of the Spire from the inside.
3. \$1,000. Group guided tour of the part of the Arch Street façade reached from scaffolding, approximately 50 feet above the sidewalk.
4. \$5,000. Ride in the crane basket and touch the cross at the top of the Spire, approximately 220 feet above the sidewalk!

Note that gifts 3 and 4 would be ideal for someone who is concerned about heights, to help them change to having an appreciation for heights.

### **Why are we asking?**

As stewards of God's building, one of our Trustees' duties is to protect public safety. One aspect of this duty is a City of Philadelphia requirement. For any building that is over 60 feet tall and constructed prior to 1950 (this means ASUMC), we must submit a report indicating the condition of the entire façade (the exterior surface) of the building.

In August 2017, after a two-day inspection, the Trustees received a draft report from the engineering firm we hired. Their findings are that three jobs must be performed prior to issuance of their final report:

1. The three-decorative masonry architectural details on the Arch Street side ("Finials") must be removed;
2. The Spire requires a hands-on inspection that can only be performed from a 250-foot crane;
3. Several other items separate from the two items above, identified during the August inspection, must be repaired;

The Church Council accepted the Trustees' recommendation that we invest approximately \$250,000 in these projects. The investment will be funded by a loan secured by the ASUMC endowment. The planning work has begun, and we hope physical work will begin in January 2018.

Assuring the safety of the building is not a one-shot deal. It requires an investment in continual maintenance. We will need an ongoing program to assure the continued safety of the façade into the future. This is true not only because of our duty as stewards of the public safety, but because we must provide the same report to the City of Philadelphia every 5 years from now on.

We learned a lesson from the outcome of the planning and construction off the parking garage next door. Nothing is impossible with God. If we truly come from a perspective that puts the Kingdom of God first, and earnestly and patiently explain our needs, God will send the things, people, and resources to make our dreams a reality.

Maybe He wants to work through you! Please support this project with your donations (as described above, or in any amount you wish) and prayers. ## Purple or Blue: What color is your Advent?



When I go to various churches on Sundays during the season of Advent I always ask the pastors, “Do you wear purple or blue stoles?”

In recent years we have seen the color blue more and more, in addition to the traditional purple.

According to [www.umc.org](http://www.umc.org) “The Christian year has two cycles: the Christmas Cycle (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany) and the Easter Cycle (Lent-Easter-Pentecost).

“Within each cycle are a preparatory season symbolized by the color purple and a festival season symbolized by the color white. After each cycle there is an ordinary time of growth symbolized by the color green.

It goes on to say that the color purple represents both royalty and penitence, while blue symbolizes hope. Purple and blue are both acceptable colors to use during Advent.

(“Why are there different colored altar cloths?”)

Upon further examination, I found that the shade of blue for Advent is often a deep, dark blue. It is like the color of the predawn sky just before the sun rises. It brings with it the meaning of expectation and anticipation of the coming of the Messiah.

Other sources remind us that the color blue is associated with the Virgin Mary. She is depicted in the color blue in many of the icons and religious art images of the past. ([www.stpaulsivy.org](http://www.stpaulsivy.org) “Why Blue for Advent”)

The season of Advent is all of this and much more. We prepare for Christmas with times of self-reflection and repentance; but we anticipate the celebration with much preparation, like we do when a special visitor comes to our home.

We revere the newborn Christ as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Our humble Savior came to serve and give his life for our sins so that we might know the promise of life everlasting in heaven. With the dawn of his coming, all of creation will be filled with his glory.

May you have a purple-blue Advent and teach well the meaning of the season to those who may only be with you at your churches during this time of the year. The most important color to wear is love, which is the fulfillment of Christ’s mission for the world and “which binds everything together in perfect harmony.” (Colossians 3:14)
