
Mark the doorway with one of more of the symbols C M B 2020

Organ Repair

On November 3rd, the organ at Arch Street stopped working. Our organ builder, Patrick Murphy & Associates, examined our organ and discovered the Spencer blower's (from pre – 1916) fan blades (from years of rust) have broken loose and are now damaged. The good news is that these Spencer blowers are able to be rebuilt and we will not need a new blower. The trustees have approved the rebuilding of the organ fan blades at a cost of \$12,000. The repair work will begin post-Christmas. Special offerings will be taken at the Christmas Concert on Sunday, December 22, 2019 (1pm) and at our Christmas Eve Candlelight Service on Tuesday, December 24, 2019 (7pm). I want to thank the Reverend Gregory Holston for his leadership within POWER for the last seven years. First, as a clergy leader and then Co-Chair of the Economic Dignity Team and then for the last three years as Executive Director. Rev. Holston's leadership saw us through the growth and development of the organization including increased revenue and staff, expansion across the state, and victories in our issue campaigns. Rev. Holston helped make POWER even stronger. Thank you, Greg! We pray for much success for you as you journey forward.

As we move forward as an organization, we are marching into a critical year in the life of our country and the world. Decisions made this year in the multiple levels of government will shape us for decades to come. For many of the national battles, Pennsylvania is ground zero.
